Inha Summer School offers intensive short term study abroad programs that take place during your academic holidays and therefore is a great way to get international experience without missing semester time. You can earn credits while gaining valuable educational and cultural experiences. By learning more about others, you will also learn more about yourself. You can become a member of international community and broaden your networks.

Programs last three weeks and are made up of approximately 90 hours of contact time (lectures, classroom learning and field trips). Students can take one common course plus two elective courses. Most institutions allow students to transfer credits to count toward their home degree programs. However, if you intend to take a Summer School program for credits, you must check program acceptability with your home institution before registering.

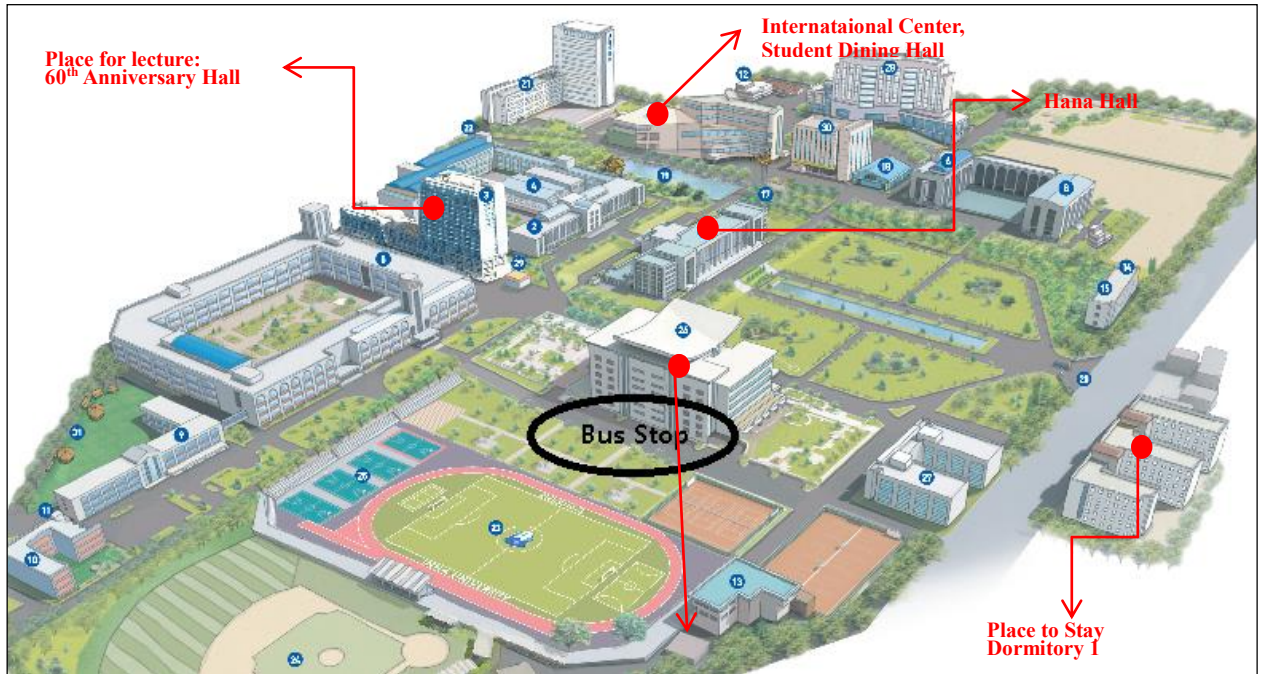
*** Information on Lotte World**

One of Korea’s largest theme parks with more than 8 million visitors every year, Lotte World boasts a lot of exciting attractions, parades, zoos and beautiful gardens. It consists of the world’s largest indoor theme park and outdoor amusement park called ‘Magic Island’, an artificial island inside a lake linked by monorail, shopping malls, a Korean folk museum, sports facilities and movie theatres. Lotte World was also one of the most popular locations used for filming the Korean TV dramas and shows including ‘Stairway to Heaven’, ‘Running Man’, ‘We Got Married’, ‘Protect the Boss’ and ‘Full House.’

◎ Accommodation Information

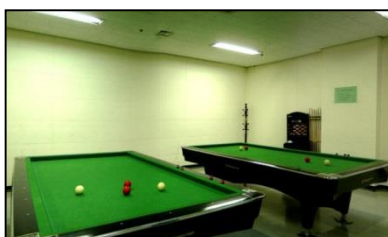
Students will live in the university residence. Each student will share a room with three other students, except those who applied for double rooms in advance. Please note that accommodation is standard university student accommodation. While this is sufficient to meet the need of most students, we find that some attendees require a more deluxe option. However, since the summer school program is only three week long, the university is unable to offer other options.

Accommodation includes:

- Bedding;
- Shared Kitchen;
- Dining Hall;
- Retail Store;
- Shared Washroom;
- Shared Shower Room;
- Computer Room;
- Laundry Room;
- Gymnasium;
- Badminton Court;
- Ping Pong Table;
- Billiard Table

* Please note that all students will have to prepare their own daily necessities such as shampoo, soap, towels, etc. The dormitory offers bed sheets, blankets and pillows only.

** Laundry Machines are NOT free. It costs 1,000 KRW to use the laundry machine.



– Daily Schedule

Living in the dormitory shall be restricted to the following schedule.

* When you enter the dorm or dining hall, you should carry your name tag.

** The dormitory will offer breakfast and dinner only. When you go to the Dining Hall, please always carry your name tag provided by the International Center on your arrival day. Students need to purchase meal coupons for lunch. You can buy a meal coupon from the vending machine in front of the dormitory dining hall in cash or by credit card. The Dining Hall is located in the dormitory basement.

*** When you move out, you have to return your room key at the night duty room at the entrance. You have to pay a penalty of 50,000 KRW if you lose your room key.

※ **Dormitory Regulations**

1. Smoking and drinking alcohol inside the dorm building are strictly prohibited.
2. Male students are NOT allowed to enter female rooms and vice versa.
3. The dormitory gate closes at 12:00 midnight after which no one is allowed to enter or exit the building.
4. Shower rooms and toilets should be kept clean and tidy at all times. You are NOT allowed to use water in the toilet.
5. There are micro ovens and kitchen facilities on each floor. However, you are NOT allowed to cook. You are permitted to cook simple instant foods only.

☞ **Breaking these rules will result in an immediate expulsion from the dorm.**

☞ Scanning Your Fingerprints



You need to register your fingerprint at the dorm upon your arrival. When you enter the building, you are required to scan your fingerprint here. If the scanner does not work, enter your room number + desk number (4 digit number) and scan your fingerprint again.

- Dining Hall Regulation



1. Please follow the mealtime stated above. When you finish your food, do NOT stay in the dining hall.
2. There are two food sections: Korean and International. You can choose only 1 option. You are NOT allowed to eat both Korean and International meals at the same time.
3. When you finish your food, you must carry your tray and return it to the return counter, which is shown above. Please separate food wastes from other wastes and put the leftover food into your soup bowl!

4. When you have lunch, you must purchase a meal coupon. You can buy a meal coupon from the vending machine in front of the dormitory dining hall in cash, or by credit card.
5. When refreshments such as milk or bread are provided during meal time, you can take only one for yourself. If you would like to take another one, ask for it ONLY AFTER finishing the first one.
6. If you need salt or other spices, feel free to take them in front of the dining hall.
7. Before eating, please check menu and food ingredients (pork, chickens etc.) on the notice board at the entrance.

◎ Insurance

Inha University will purchase your health insurance plan which will cover part of your medical expenses while you are participating in the summer school program. However, you will NOT be insured during your flight and after the end of the program. Therefore, you are strongly encouraged to purchase additional travel insurance for your trip before coming to Korea.

◎ Internet Access

– In your dormitory room

Wireless internet access is available inside your dormitory room. (Wifi is NOT available in other areas of the dormitory) You can also use the Internet by connecting a LAN cable in your dorm room (Alternatively, you can use one of the computers in the PC room in the dorm for free).

*** SSID: inha_Dormitory1 / PASSWORD: inha2000**

– In the campus buildings

Wireless internet access is available in other campus buildings as well. In order to get on the Internet, you need to know your student ID and password (Your default password is well explained above in the 'I-Class' section). Here are the ways of enjoying the Wi-Fi service on campus:

*** For MS Windows 7 users:**

- Download wireless LAN connection manager (CUVIC) from internet.inha.ac.kr → INHA-WLAN2 → windows 2000/XP or windows Vista client (click download button) → Install and reboot → Run CUVIC program and double click INHA-WLAN2 → Input your INHA portal ID/password in authentication pop-up window

*** For MS Windows 8, 10 users:**

- Connect INHA-WLAN2 → Input ID/password of INHA portal

*** For Apple Mobile Device users:**

- Settings → Wifi (On) → Connect INHA-WLAN2
- Enter your INHA portal ID/password

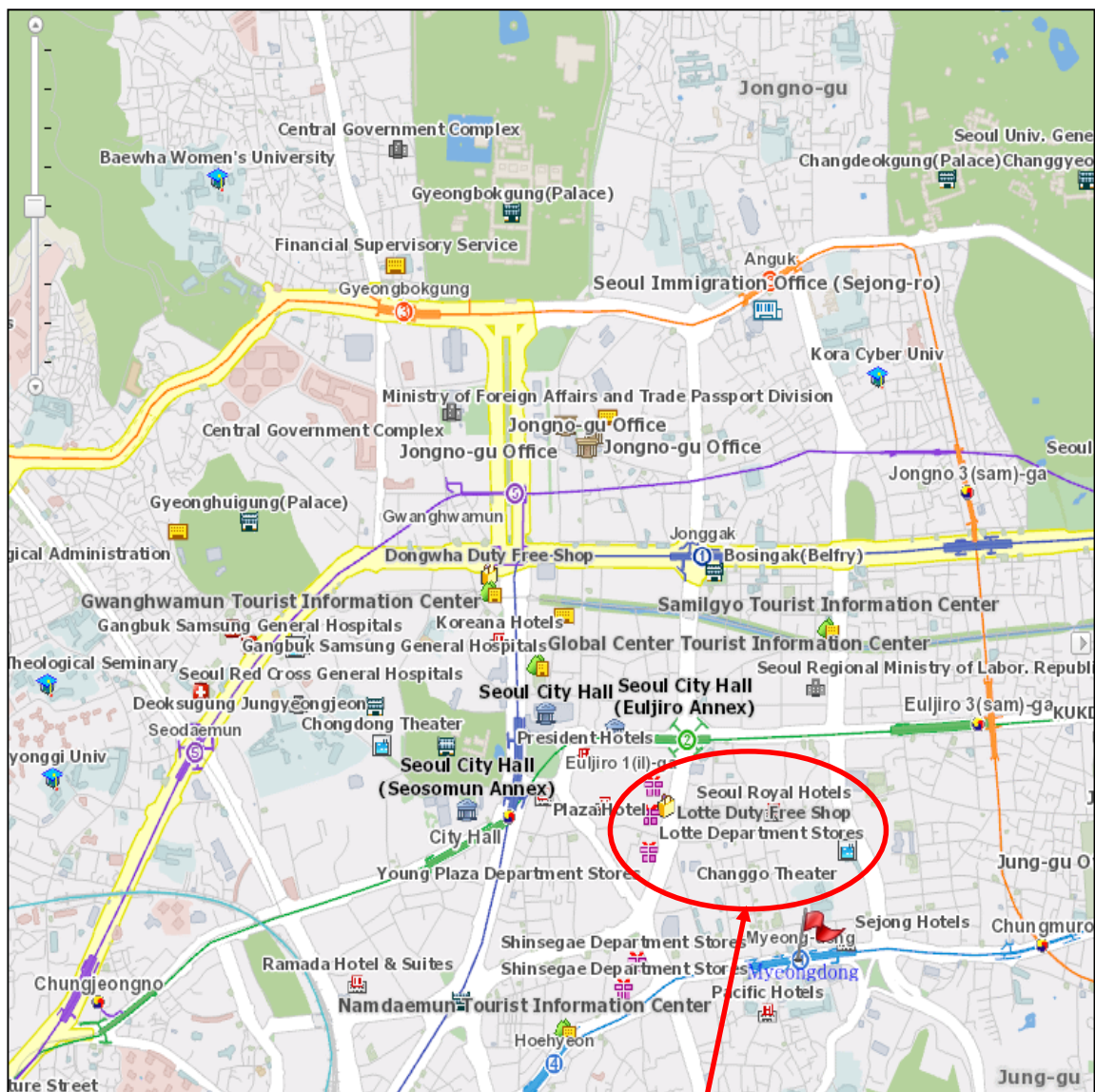

Course Description

Starting from one of the poorest countries (GDP per capita less than US\$100 in the 1960) in the world, the Korean economy has changed itself to be a high income country in just one generation (PPP US \$36,700 in 2015). Along with this economic success, political democracy has also been firmly established.

This two-credit course will overview the economic development of Korea from the end of World War II through the Korean War period and then in more detail from the 1960s to the present time. To explain this success, Korea's specific economic development policies, the Korean culture, social value system, and the modern socio-political environment will be discussed.

Course Objectives

This course is designed to help international students who are interested in the Korean economic development to find the answers to question such as: "How could Korea develop its economy so successfully in such a short period of time?" "Can other poor countries adopt a similar model to develop their countries?" "Are there any side effects from the speedy development?" Students will be given a variety of economic data reflecting Korea's economic development in the past. As a result, students will gain a better understanding of the Korean society.

Text Books

There is no textbook for this class.

Other Texts and References

Current event news articles related to the economy and economic statistics from economic organizations will be used in the class.

Class Structure

Grading system is based on points and not percentages. Grades will be based on most to least points. The items listed are tentative, meaning some might change a little. Such as discussion or etc. as needed.

Attendance is very important. Attendance will be taken each class. Class participation is based on best effort in doing the activities. Students have to be in-class, with attendance

checked, to receive participation points.

Class structure will consist of short lectures on a specific topic and then team activities to reinforce learning of the lecture topics. The class might be 30 to 40% lecture and 60 to 70% in-class team activities on a specific topic. News articles and other sources will be used in the class instead of a text book.

The class topics are tentative. Some will be covered more; some might be covered less, depending on the dynamics of the class and the current events in the economy.

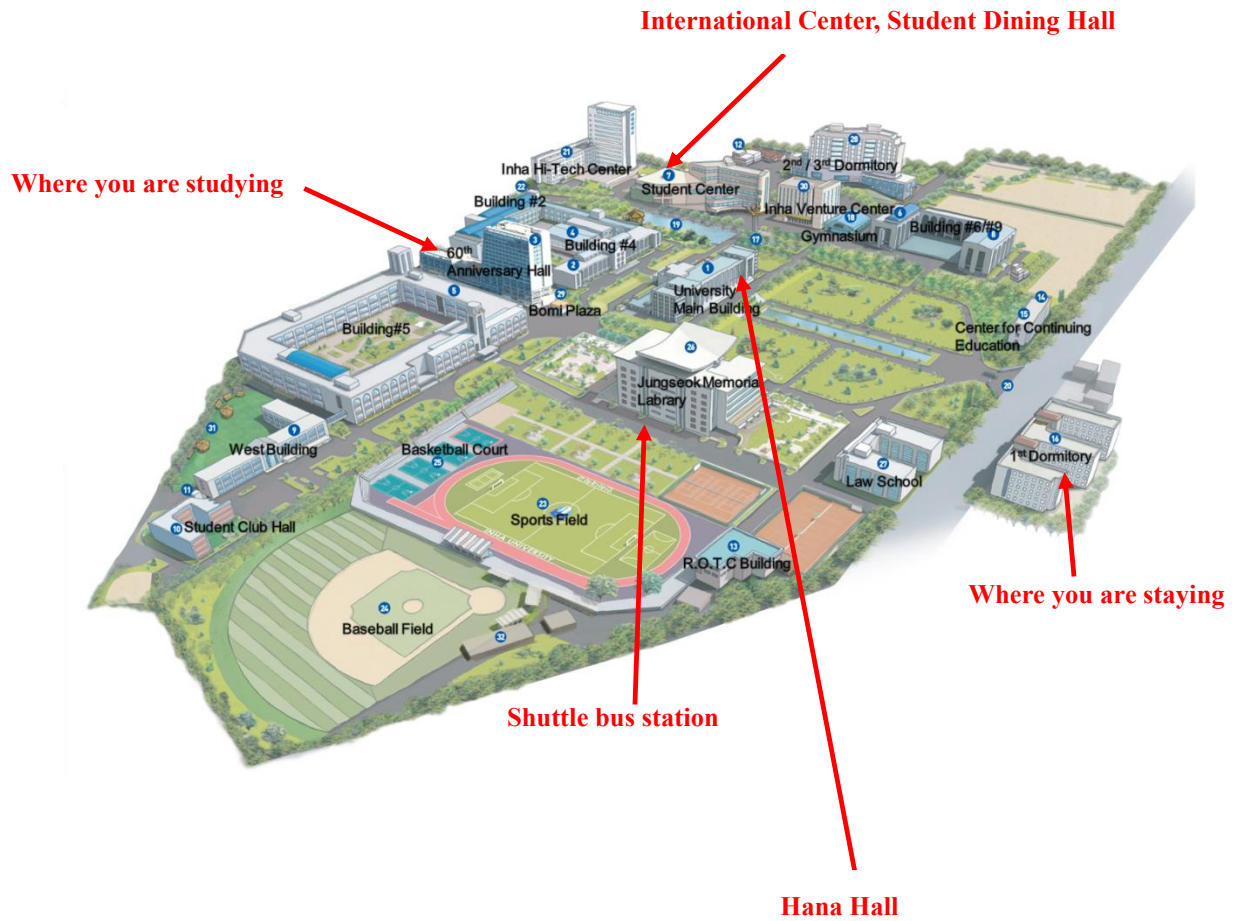

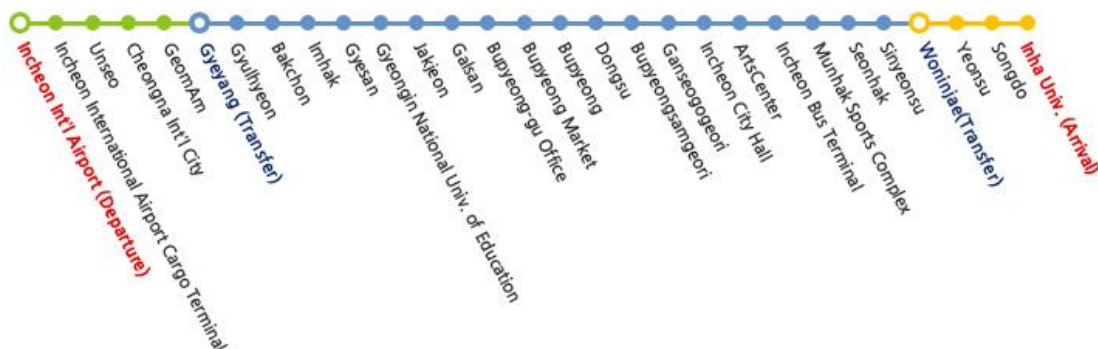


Appendix 3. Campus Location

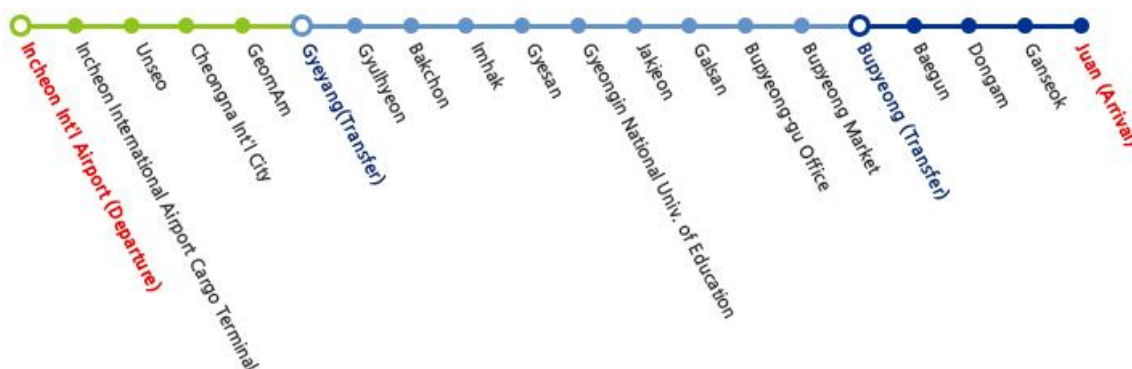
