Course Description

This course offers a unique educational experience to broaden students' exposure to English – an international language enriched with diverse accents, sounds, and features. The “standard,” the “nativized,” and the “new” varieties of English are observed and discussed in the context of relevant topics, such as the environment, sustainable development goals, Korean pop culture, and emerging technologies.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students should be able to engage with more current and critical questions in their English language learning journey: not merely focused on satisfying certain norms and standards to prove language achievement but more importantly, asking what is realistic, attainable, and consistent with contemporary global expectations.

- {Time commitment} 3 hours in the classroom x 9 meetings, and your personal reading and study time outside of class.
- {Important reminder} All students are expected to change seats and partners every meeting. Therefore, 9 meetings = 9 different seats.
